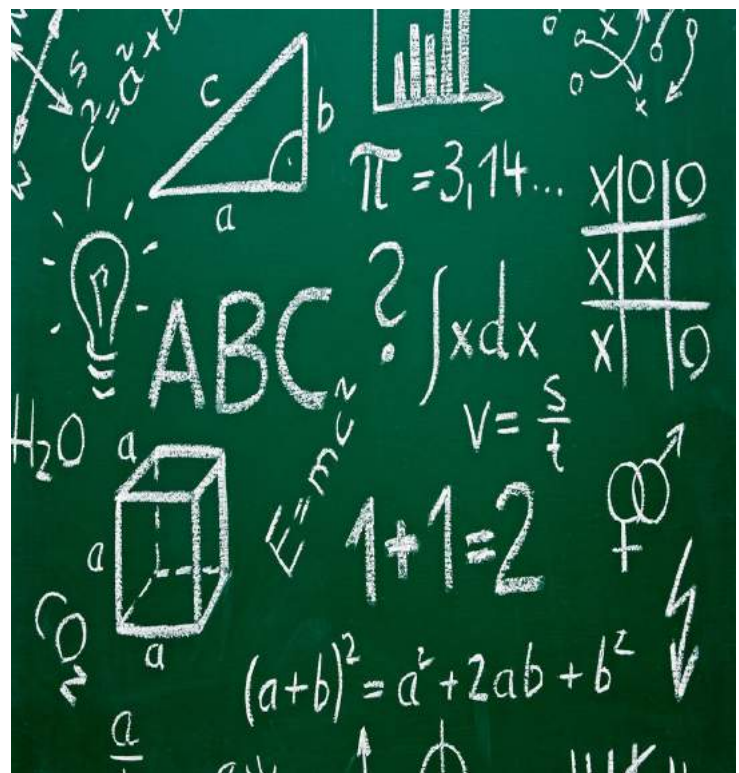

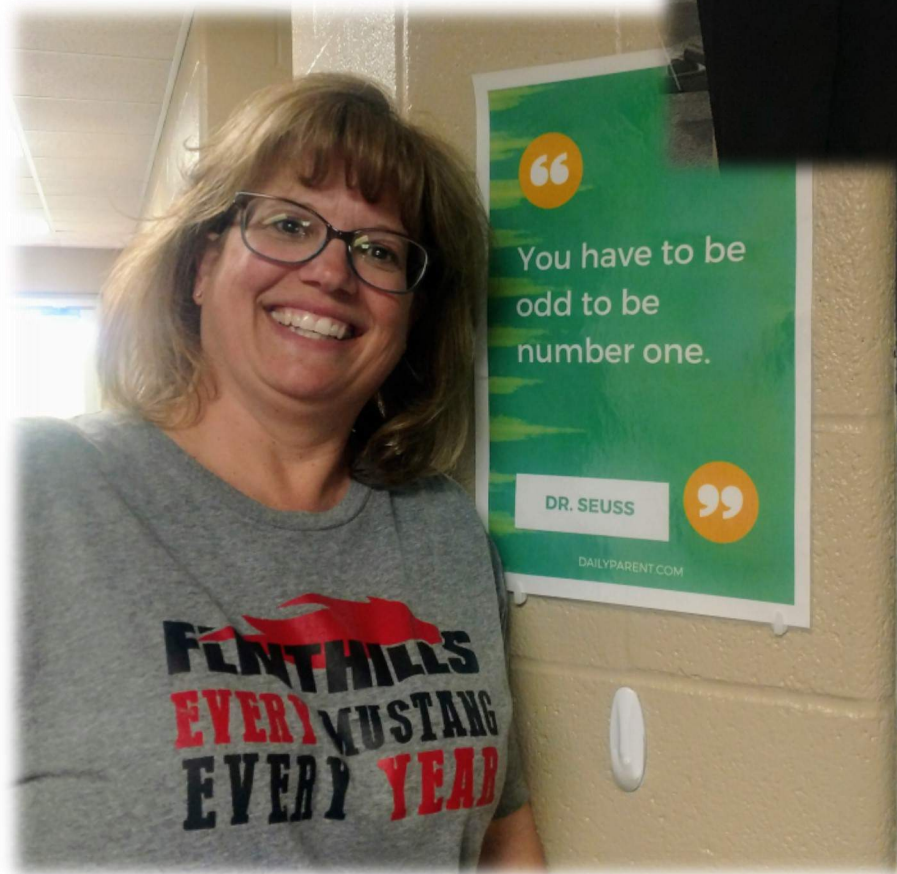

Favorite memories from FHS: I set the fire alarm off with the fog machine in Mr. Myrick's room sophomore year. I learned not to use the fog machine in the school.

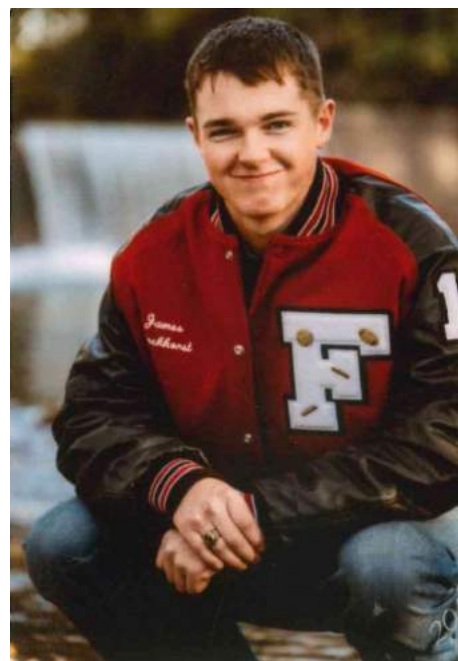
What you want to be remembered for: That I am a good person. That I stayed true to myself and sometimes had to do things on my own. That's okay.

Favorite memories from FHS: The high school plays and when the basketball team went to Pitt State and some Hotel dude called Monty “Monte Bob.”

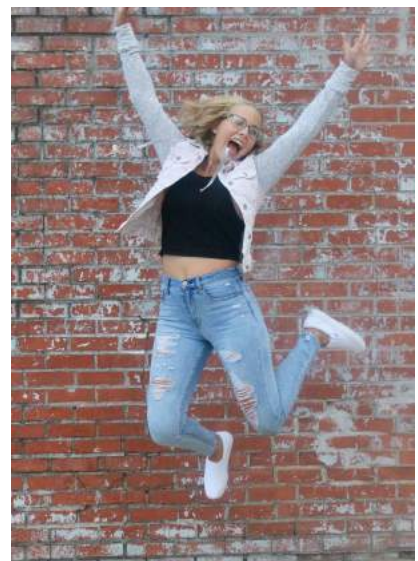
What you want to be remembered for: For theatre and always reading books. And also that I’m 5’9” but that I act 12 feet tall.

What you want to be remembered for: I don’t know what I want to be remembered for. I live in the moment. That’s how I ride.



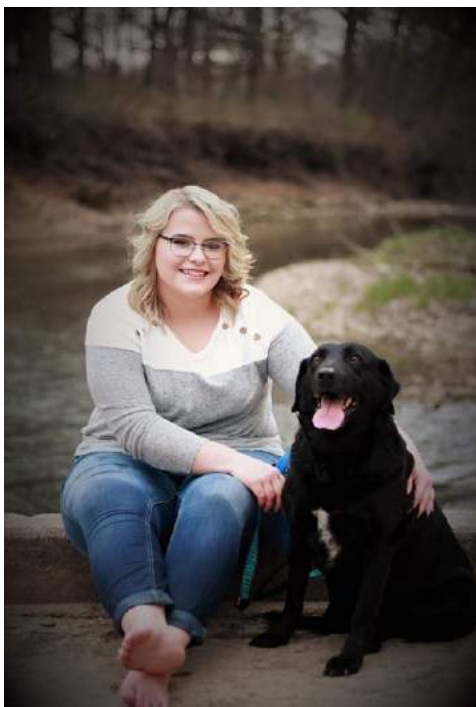
PEYTEN GIRTY

What you want to be remembered for: Being the weird dude. I don't know. That's what Brooke said.

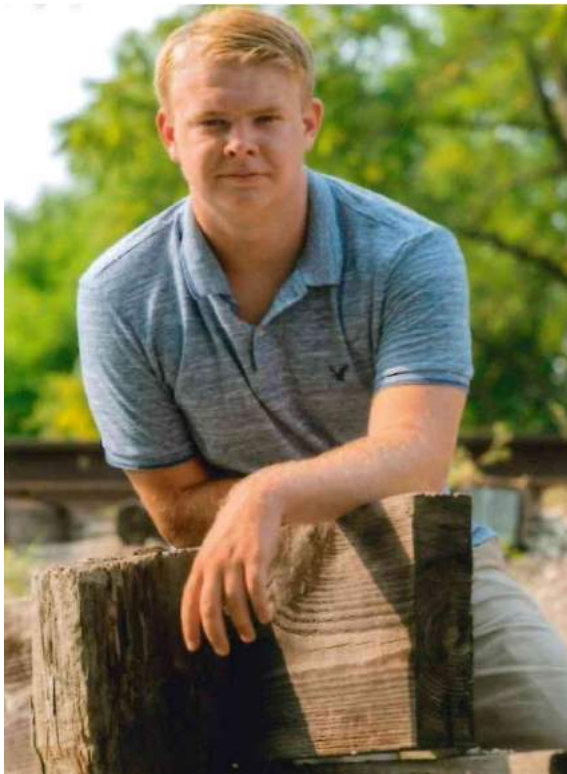


JEFFREY GARCIA

What you want to be remembered for: I don't know if I want people to remember me. I cried a lot. For being true to myself .



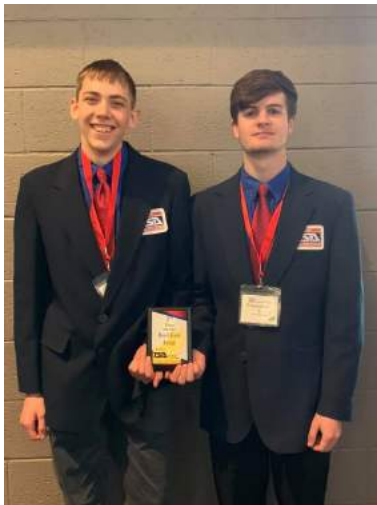


Eight Flinthills TSA members recently competed in the state competition in Salina. The state event consists of three days of non-stop competing in a variety of events, including giving speeches, interviews, tech bowl, problem solving, writing essays. Allison Gawith, Lorenzo Castagna, Brandon Gleason, Ethan Stopczynski, Dawson Sharp and Jonathan McCreight were all new to TSA, competing at state for the first time. Returning members consisted of Philip Humig and Wade Haynes. All competed very well, and represented Flinthills High School very well. Wade Haynes made the semi-finals in

Extemporaneous Speech, but fell short of placing. In the end five team members qualified to compete in the National TSA Competition in National Harbor, MD. Philip Humig & Wade Haynes placed third in state for their Board Game Design. Jonathan McCreight, Dawson Sharp & Lorenzo Castagna placed second for their mockumentary video.

While at the competition Philip and Wade ran for state officer positions. Philip is the newly elected state Sergeant-at-Arms, and Wade will now serve as the new state Treasurer. Both young men will be participating in several leadership events, starting with the Kansas

CTSO (Career & Technical Student Organization) training in June. This training will be with state officers in all student career oriented organizations, including DECA, FCLA, FBLA, and SkillsUSA. They will also be helping to host next year's Fall and Winter Leadership workshops, as well as next year's State Conference.

Flinthills High School SAFE program recently hosted Garry Parker to speak to our student body about distracted driving. Mr. Parker has 39 years of law enforcement experience and retired from the Texas Department of Public Safety in 2009 as the Public Information Officer at the State Capitol. He is currently employed as a Law Enforcement Liaison and Instructor with the Texas Municipal Police Association. His passion for ending the senseless death on our nations roadways was evident in his presentation.

The students felt that his speech was inspirational, humorous, and motivating. He introduced our students to the app Safe 2 Save. This app (access code: SAFEKS) This app allows the users (parents can use it too!) to earn points by enabling the app while driving, discouraging students from using their phone while driving. While not active in Kansas (Yet!), points can be used at several locations for free stuff (McDonalds, Chic-Fil-A, Taco Bell, etc). If Kansas shows enough people use the app the hope is to encourage companies to join in on rewarding students with points. The high school is looking into rewarding students on our own for students who earn points on the app, so stay tuned!
