Title I Program Information

Title I is a federal program that provides additional reading and/or math instruction. The students who qualify are not learning disabled. They just need extra help with math or reading.

What are the goals of Title I?

The Title I program strives to provide an environment that:

- Promotes a positive attitude toward reading
- Improves student achievement in reading and math
- Builds students' self-esteem and confidence

How does my child qualify for Title I?

Several different criteria are used to qualify a student. AimsWeb scores, Pathways to Reading assessments, and teacher recommendations are considered when referring a student for Title I services.

Will my child always be in the program?

No. We work closely with the classroom teacher to monitor student progress. When a student's reading or math achievement reaches their appropriate grade level, the student is dropped from the program if the Title I teacher and classroom teacher feel the student no longer needs the extra support.

How does Title I benefit my child?

The Title I teacher provides intensive, individualized instruction to students who need it. As students experience success, they gain confidence in their abilities and their performance in the classroom improves.

Parents Right to Know

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), parents may request information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's/children's classroom teachers and paraprofessionals including:

Whether or not the teacher has met Kansas licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas being taught;

The baccalaureate degree and any other graduate certification or degree and the field of discipline of both;

If services are provided by paraprofessionals, their qualifications;

If the teacher is teaching under an emergency or professional waiver.

Parents will be contacted by the school if their child(ren) is taught for four or more continuous weeks by a teacher that does not meet the appropriate state certification standards.

All students/families served in schoolwide buildings and students/families served in targeted assistance programs must complete a parent school compact.

All parents will be informed they have the right to request their child's/children's state assessment scores and they have a right to obtain the school and school district state report cards.

Principal's Corner



Happy 2019-20 School year! We are having a GREAT beginning to our school year. We have worked through some scheduling glitches, but feel very good about what we have. I just wanted to take this opportunity to share some 'whys' from our schedule and system...

6th grade MUSIC – There have been many questions about this class and its requirement. This class was created to help my new teacher Mrs. Grover provide an appetizer tray for our new MS students. We are excited about the possibilities of “building” our music program. Mrs. Grover is going to teach Band, Vocal, Theory, Dance, reading notes, love for MUSIC, etc. Instead of learning on recorders, they are going to learn on instruments – free of charge! For some, this may be ‘one and done’ but for some this may help create a lifetime love of MUSIC!

MS MTSS MATH – This class was created to help our Middle Schoolers who struggle with math skills and need extra support. This year we used a combination of teacher referral and student request for entry in the class. Next year we will base it on test scores as well. MTSS stands for Multi-Tier System of Support. This support has been alive and well in our Primary/Intermediate buildings and we are looking to expand to MS and HS.

We have hired an AT-RISK para to help support ALL students. Holten Nelson will join the staff to support learning where and as needed for students who do not qualify for other learning help or support.

8th grade Science/Social Studies – We have 31 eighth graders! What a great “problem” to have! We have this group split for Math and English, but with schedule restrictions, in Science and Social Studies all students are together. In addition to a classroom teacher, each group has our At-Risk para and SPED support as individual learning plans require.



We have 2 new CTE – Career Tech Education teachers: Caity Thompson – AG and Tod Johnson – Ind Tech. Since they were hired late in the year, we were not able to utilize their talents in our schedule last spring. Since then, we have added some really neat classes and are hoping to generate interest from students, for example: Small Engines, Welding, Carpentry, Woodworking Principles, just to name a few. The district has invested in a Plasma Cam/Cutter to be utilized in teaching students that will benefit the school as well as the community!

We are offering Algebra 1 Part 1 for students who are not quite ready for Algebra 1. The intention is for students to be able to work through Algebra concepts at a slower pace. Algebra 1 would be stretched over 2 years (Alg.1 Part 1 and Part 2) to be followed by Geometry to fulfill state and local requirements.

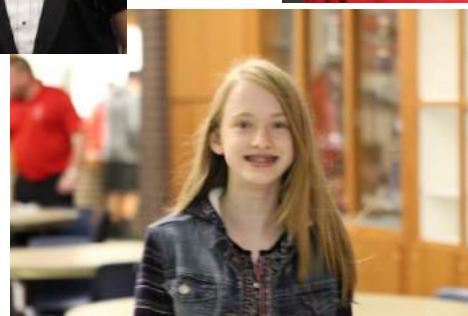
Spanish 1 and 2 will look differently this year. Rather than taking these classes via the IDL – on-line from Greenbush 2 days a week, we will offer it through Orion on-line learning with Mrs. Tresa Garcia teaching/monitoring students in learning the language. This is a pilot program being developed by Orion/Flinthills that is having great results already!

We have many students taking advantage of college classes, Career Tech Ed opportunities, work release and vocational training opportunities. Some students travel while others are here at Flinthills learning. Scheduling has been a challenge but we feel these are great opportunities for our students to be able to explore and take advantage of multiple learning opportunities!

We want to make sure and welcome our new teachers this year. Mr. Ric Stamper – Math, Mr. Alan Vancil– HS Science, and Mrs. Jamie Swafford – MS Science, Mrs. Joan Grover – Music, Ms. Caity Thompson and Mr. Tod Johnson - Career Tech Ed, Mrs. Linda Barker – Gifted, Mrs. Tresa Garcia – Spanish/Music, Mrs. Wright – SPED para and Holton Nelson – At-Risk para.

We also want to welcome ALL of our NEW students! I know I speak for our staff by saying Welcome Back! We are looking forward to an AWESOME year!!!
