Dr. Seuss Week Challenge



April, 2018 Straight From the Desk of Mr. Boldra

Dear Flinthills Community,

Every year brings new challenges and opportunities as we experience turnover in staff in our district. We will be interviewing Middle/High School Principal candidates April 3, 4, and 6, and we would like you to be part of the process. We will have a "Meet and Greet" opportunity between 3pm and 4pm in the Board Office on each of those days. On April 3rd, we will be interviewing Darlene Griffiths from Herrington. On April 4th, we will be interviewing Tyler Gray from Golden City, Missouri. And on April 6th, we will be interviewing Mike Estes from Farson, Wyoming. And, yes, Mr. Estes was a former teacher at Flinthills that many of you may know.

Another topic for consideration...

In light of the staff turnover, we recognize some opportunities to be more efficient and effective next year. We are considering moving the 6th Graders to the Middle School next year for the following reasons. First, we can be more efficient in the use of our staff. Currently, we struggle to get our middle school teachers full course schedules without being really creative. With Ms. Hodge's retirement, and the hiring of an additional science teacher (which is necessary), we feel we can offer 6th graders a great educational experience. Second, 6th graders are currently intermingling with 7th and 8th graders on the bus and at sporting events as they are allowed to compete in middle school sports; however, most of the 6th grade courses will be 6th grade only. Music and P.E. courses may be the exceptions. One of the advantages is that 6th graders will now be switching classes & instructors each hour, which will provide a change of pace that we feel will benefit some of both our students and teachers. Third, we feel that with our middle school pod, hallway, locker set up, and security system, we can supervise all middle school students well. As a parent of a 6th grader next year, the addition of the 6th grade class to the middle school doesn't worry me in the slightest. We have great schools with great teachers and great students, and we have all the confidence that we can make any shift of students successful, especially 6th graders to middle school. Most middle schools have 6th graders in them already. I know that I attended middle school when I was in 6th grade, and I loved it. Sure there was some anxiety at first, but I believe there will be less anxiety with our students because so many of them already know each other. Flinthills is a family, and we will take care of each other. I realize that there may be some reservations about such a change, but if you really have a grave concern, I would welcome your feedback, and encourage any discussion you would like to have. 




Have multiple ways to receive weather info:

- NOAA Weather Radio with a warning alarm tone
- Local radio and television
- Internet
- Friends, family and co-workers

Tornado Safety Tips

Down to the lowest level Under something

sturdy

Cover your head

Keep in the shelter until the storm has passed

Overpasses are not a safe refuge due to flying debris from the powerful tornadic winds. Additionally winds under an overpass are channeled and could easily carry you out from under the overpass and throw you hundreds of yards.

Indoors: Go to the lowest level and shelter into a room in the center of the building without windows. A centrally located stairwell is an option. ABANDON MOBILE HOMES IMMEDIATELY!! Determine your shelter ahead of time.

Outdoors: Find a substantial structure. If no suitable structure is nearby, lie flat in the nearest ditch and use your hands to cover your head. Be alert for flash floods. If no ditch is available, you may remain in your vehicle, put on your seatbelt, lower yourself below window level and cover your head with your hands or a blanket.



Lightning Safety

- Watch for developing thunderstorms and be ready to act when thunder is heard.
- Lightning can strike as far as 10 miles from an area where it is raining. That's about the distance you can hear thunder.

If you can hear thunder, you are within striking distance. Seek safe shelter IM-MEDIATELY!

- Outdoor Activities: Minimize the risk of being struck by moving indoors or to vehicles at the first roar of thunder.
- Inside Activities: Things to avoid
 - Corded phones
 - Computers
 - Other electrical equipment
 - Indoor/Outdoor pools
 - Tubs and showers and other things connected to metal plumbing

Wait 30 minutes after the last roar of thunder before going outside again.

 Help a Lightning Victim: Call 911 and get help immediately. You are in no danger when helping them. The charge will not affect you.

When Thunder Roars, Go Indoors! See a Flash, Dash Inside!

Hail Safety

Thunderstorms are capable of producing hail ranging from pea to grapefruit sized or larger. Larger hail means a stronger thunderstorm. A three inch hailstone can fall to the ground as fast as 107 mph!

Outdoor Safety

- Check the forecast before heading out
- Have multiple ways to receive warnings
- Have an evacuation plan
- Know where you can find a shelter nearby
- Pack a safety kit and weather radio
- When action needs to be taken, don't wait!

Flood Safety

- Floods, especially flash floods, kill more people each year than any other weather phenomenon.
- As little as 6 inches of fast moving water can sweep you off of your feet.
- As little as 18-24 inches of water is enough to float a car and carry it away.
- If you see a road barrier across a flooded roadway....

TURN AROUND, DON'T DROWN!

- Tune to the NOAA Weather Radio or your favorite news source for all flood and any other weather related information.
- Leave areas subject to flooding such as dips, low spots and underpasses.
- Do not attempt to cross flowing streams, you don't know how deep the water could be.
- Never drive through flooded roadways.
- If your vehicle is suddenly caught in rising water, leave it immediately and seek higher ground.
- Report any flooding to your local authorities or to the National Weather Service.

Turn Around. Don't Drown!

Wind Safety

Thunderstorms are capable of producing hail and strong straight line winds. Straight line winds can exceed 125 mph and are responsible for most thunderstorm wind damage. A downburst is a small area of rapidly descending air beneath a thunderstorm which can cause damage equivalent to a strong tornado.

You should seek shelter indoors and stay away from windows when thunderstorms are in the area.
