Dear STAFF, Parents and Community,

My goal is to learn something new every day... and on Friday, my mind was blown!

It was reported to me that we have students who are using JUULS in school. JUULS, according to the urban dictionary, are a highly concentrated nicotine vaporizer which underage kids use to get a buzz. It is commonly mistaken for a USB stick which makes it easy to use in school. Other sources share that the amount of nicotine in one JUUL cartridge is roughly equal to the amount of nicotine in a pack of cigarettes, or about 200 puffs which is double the concentration found in other e-cigs.

First of all, you have to be 18 to purchase these products, 21 on some of them. So majority of our students who have them, have them ILLEGALLY.

Secondly, our school policy prohibits tobacco products in the building or on school grounds and we have policies to deal with that abuse.

Third, we do not know yet what the health effects are for JUULS. I have included an article, 4 things parents need to know about Juuls and nicotine addiction for you to review.

I am concerned! On Friday, we had students who admitted to using JUULS in school, we had 4 students with JUULS on them and MANY MORE who I know just didn't get caught. We had an assembly on Friday with students and a staffing with teachers. We ARE going to address this problem!

I apologize - but because of some of our student's actions, we will be managing our school and classrooms with MORE structure and LESS privileges until further notice.

It was reported students have been JUULING during 'restroom breaks', on the bus to games, running out to their car for something, and even in class! I confiscated several JUULS and pods and they are

on my table and they will be used to educate. Please feel free to drop by to learn more. I visited with the Butler County Sheriff department and they confirmed this IS a problem and students CAN be charged if they possess or consume JUULS.

PLEASE help us help your student make good choices that will lead to them being the best MUSTANG they can be! Thanks for your help and support.

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4 things parents need to know about juul and nicotine addiction

IF you are the parent of a middle or high school student, you may already know that the popular new e-cigarette JUUL is reigniting concerns about nicotine addiction in youth.

JUUL has been making headlines and prompting crackdowns from the Food and Drug Administration for its popularity among teens. The device, which captured 68 percent of the e-cigarette market in just two years, has caused alarm in schools across the country due to widespread reports of its use on school property.

"I think parents really need to know what's going on in the schools, and I think they'd be shocked," said Dr. Judy Groner, chair of the American Academy of Pediatrics Section on Tobacco Control and a pediatrician at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio. "We need to have teachers, principals, school personnel and parents all aware of what this product is, what it looks like and what it's doing to the kids."

We talked with Dr. Groner about four things parents should know about JUUL and nicotine addiction.

1. JUUL has a higher nicotine content than many other e-cigarettes.

While <u>e-cigarettes are less toxic than cigarettes</u>, they still contain toxins and the addictive chemical nicotine, which is harmful to adolescent brain development. The adolescent brain is also more susceptible to addiction. The amount of <u>nicotine in one JUUL cartridge</u> is roughly equal to the amount of nicotine in a pack of cigarettes, or about 200 puffs, according to the <u>product website</u>. That's double the concentration of nicotine found in other e-cigarettes, the American Academy of Pediatrics stated in its resource "JUULing: What Pediatricians and Families Need to Know."

"I think everybody has been caught unaware as to how incredibly addictive JUUL is," said Groner, who added that she and many pediatricians are "very concerned about addiction."

2. The ability to hide JUUL enables frequent use.

JUUL is easy to hide from parents and teachers because it looks like a flash drive and can be charged in a USB port. It also does not produce a strong odor.

These characteristics enable discreet use, especially in schools. In fact, <u>almost one-fifth of middle and high school students have seen JUUL used in school</u>, according to an April 2018 Truth Initiative® survey of more than 1,000 youth between 12 and 17 years old.

"They can sneak it into their pocket and carry it with them all the time and take a couple puffs in the bathroom or even in the classroom," Groner said. "They're getting that much more nicotine over the course of the day."

3. Kids are attracted to flavored e-cigarettes and believe they are less harmful.

JUUL comes in a variety of flavors, such as fruit medley, mango, cool cucumber and creme bru-lee. Flavors in tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, have been found to attract kids. Research shows that young people are more likely to try flavored e-cigarettes and believe that they are less harmful than tobacco-flavored e-cigarettes. Many youth e-cigarette users also incorrectly believe they aren't consuming nicotine. The majority of youth e-cigarette users think they consumed only flavoring, not nicotine, the last time they used a product, according to an annual national survey of more than 40,000 students from the University of Michigan 2016 Monitoring the Future study.

"It is no wonder that JUUL e-cigarettes have rapidly caught on with youth — **they look like a sleek USB flash drive, are easily concealed** and come in youth-appealing flavors like mint, mango and creme brulee," said <u>Robin Koval</u>, CEO and president of Truth Initiative. "Unfortunately, young people are unaware that JUUL packs a powerful nicotine punch with a single cartridge equal to an entire pack of cigarettes. This escalates the urgency for FDA regulation and public education regarding the risks for young people."

4. Pediatricians are still learning about JUUL.

Detecting and monitoring JUUL use can be a challenge for pediatricians. A Truth Initiative study published in Tobacco Control found that <u>many young people refer to the use of JUUL as "JUULing,"</u> indicating that it is so distinctive, it is perceived as its own category.

"The people who use JUUL don't consider themselves smokers and they actually don't consider themselves vapers. They use the term 'JUUL,' and if pediatricians aren't aware of what JUUL is, they might not even ask the right questions," Groner said.

"They need to be able to have honest conversations with their patients about how difficult it's going to be for them to quit and why they shouldn't start," Groner said, "especially if kids are in social circles where their friends are using it, but they themselves have not tried it, which is very common."

E-cigarettes are putting an entire generation at risk of nicotine dependence. Truth Initiative, the American Academy of Pediatrics, other public health and medical groups and individual pediatricians filed a federal lawsuit challenging an FDA decision to delay fully regulating e-cigarettes until 2022 — a full five years past the original deadline, and six years since the FDA finalized a rule to have regulatory authority over all tobacco products. The groups are also calling on the FDA to take immediate action to address the rising popularity of JUUL among youth, as well as a slew of copycat products that have been introduced in recent months.

The surgeon general declared in a 2016 report that e-cigarette use among young people "is now a major public health concern" because early e-cigarette use and nicotine addiction can harm brain development and increase the risk of young people smoking cigarettes.

POLICY REMINDERS

For notifications of cancellations – please check the school website or school Facebook page... We do our best to keep these updated on all the latest changes in our school calendar!

We have had some ATTENDANCE and CELL PHONE issues, so I decided to share some information straight from our school handbook. Please feel free to call with any questions or concerns.

We at Flinthills Middle/High School feel that attendance is a very important part of any student's education. We believe that homework and tests alone cannot adequately measure all learning that takes place. Attendance and class participation help ensure that students get the most from their educational experience. Our philosophy also dictates that proper attendance in school is the development of a good habit to carry to the work place.

Consequences for Non Attendance

Regular attendance at school is the primary responsibility of the student and parent. Other than absences for school-sponsored activities, a student will not be allowed to miss more than ten class periods per course in a semester to receive credit for the class. For any (excused or unexcused) absences exceeding ten the student will be required to make up the time before or after school to receive credit for the class. Students who are absent for more than ten days, excused or unexcused, may provide appropriate documentation for the reasons of the absences to the administration, which is empowered to grant an exception to accommodate unavoidable circumstances. A student is considered to be absent when he/she is not in the right class assigned for a particular period of the day. If a student is absent from school, the parents/guardians must notify the office by phone or send a signed, written note within 48 hours of the reason.


With certain limited expectations, every child between the ages of 7 and 18 is required by law to attend school. Students who are absent from school without a valid excuse for all or a significant part of the day (4 or more periods) for THREE consecutive days, or FIVE or more days in any one semester or SEVEN days in a school year are truant. A student is truant if he/she is inexcusably absent from school for a significant part of the day (4 or more periods). All cases of truancy must be reported to the appropriate statutory authorities. Students 13 and under shall be reported to the local office of Department of Child and Families (DCF) and students over 13 shall be reported to the county attorney.

CELL PHONE USE

- *Cell Phones may be used before school, during lunch and after school and during passing time. Any other time the cell phone will be turned off unless requested by a staff member. Exceptions will be approved by the administration.
- * Teachers and Administrators reserve the right see a student's cell phone to check for compliance. Failure to do so will result in:
 - *1st time phone will be confiscated and taken to office. Student may retrieve after school.
 - *2nd time phone will be confiscated and taken to office. Student will serve one detention. Only parent may retrieve phone.
 - *3rd time phone will be confiscated and taken to office. Student will receive one day ISS. Only parent may retrieve phone. Student may not bring a cell phone to school for the rest of the semester
 - *Incidents over 3 times will be handled individually by the principal.
 - *Any illegal use of the cell phone will be turned over to the sheriff or legal authority.

 Due to the enormous time spent on stolen electronic devices, the school will NOT investigate stolen electronic devices. Their security is the sole responsibility of the student.


tion on March 2. The museum is located at 110 S Main in ElDorado, with regular hours from 9-5.
