FHS ACTORS QUALIFY FOR INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION!



In November, four FHS Theatre Department performers competed in Solo Acting at the Texas/Oklahoma/Kansas Tri-State Theatre Conference. The conference was virtual due to Covid restrictions, so the FHS Acting entries were recorded using a green screen background and sent electronically to a panel of professional judges. Actors are judged on such skills as transitions, objective tactics, vocal intonation, subtext, integration of body, and believable character relationships.

Morgan Holcomb, Savannah McCreight and Kaily Gilman scored a "Superior" Rating to advance to the prestigious International Thespian Festival Competition held June 22-25th at the University of Indiana. Madilynn Thomas scored an "Excellent" Rating which was just points shy of advancing.

Morgan also submitted an audition performance video to the Tri-State conference and received 23 callbacks for college scholarship offers from universities such as Louisiana State University, Wichita State University, DePaul University, Kansas State University, The University of Mobile, The American Academy of Dramatic Arts (AMDA), Sterling College, Emporia State University, The University of Oklahoma, Hussian College of Los Angeles, The University of Central Missouri, Tabor College, Theatre of Arts Hollywood, and The Atlantic Acting School as well as others.

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Letter from Mr. Hunter, the middle/high school principal....

Last week, toward the end of staff development time, I introduced our Middle and High School staff to the "Growth Mindset" book by Carol S. Dweck Ph.D. Dr. Dweck is a world renowned Stanford University psychologist. She believes after decades of research she discovered a simple but groundbreaking idea: the power of mindset. Dr. Dweck believes, "people with a fixed mindset-those who believe that abilities are fixed-are less likely to flourish than those with a growth mindset-those who believe that abilities can be developed."

An example of a fixed mindset would say, "I'm not good at math". Having a growth mindset would say, "Math isn't my best subject but I will continue to try hard to improve." Sometimes just the way we think about things can help change our attitude about a challenge. When we put a good attitude and effort into something, improvement and higher achievement can be attained.

As we begin the second semester, my desire would be to see all of our students continue to grow and achieve in their academics but also in the way they believe in themselves.




The Middle School and High School Bands showed off some of their pep band songs:


























Twelve Days of SAFE Christmas

CASSODAY BOOSTERS 4-H—#Opportunity4all


The Cassoday Boosters 4-H club participated in several community outreach programs in December.



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Meet the FHS Fine Arts Department

Although she was born in North Hollywood, Michal Austin spent the majority of her school years in Denver and Sharon Springs, KS. She earned an Associates of Art degree from Butler and a Bachelor of Arts Education degree at

Wichita State University. The year she graduated from college was the same year the Flinthills BOE voted to add an art department. She applied and was hired 27 years ago to start the new program. Her current assignment is 3-12 Visual Arts & HS CTE Visual Arts (Photoshop/Video Editing/Intro to Graphic Design/Photoshop).

Besides being a co-pilot for the Redesign, she also sponsors several clubs: TSA, SAFE, the Senior Class and the Stomping Grounds. Moreover, she is President of the local teacher association, a member of the PDC Committee, Technology Committee, Negotiating Committee, TSA State Advisory Committee, Fun Committee, and sponsoring the Washington D.C. trip.

She has presented at International Technology Conferences in Colorado and California with Barb Anderson on Geocaching; the pair also presented in Georgia at a National Conference on Place-Based Learning. In addition, she has presented several times at various art and technology conferences at the

Ms. Grover has been a professional accompanist since 1972 and began teaching piano lessons in 1974. While raising her children as a single parent, she taught English at the Middle School, High School, and College levels and was the Economic Development Director of Stockton.

She has played keyboards and saxophone in various bands ranging from a country-western/polka band to a rock band. Parent Information to Encourage Child Education

How to Help Your Child Be S.M.A.R.T about Goal Setting!

A new year is a great time to set new goals! When helping children set goals, it is important to encourage them to identify the goal and also be able to know when they have reached it! Try writing goals using the S.M.A.R.T. goal format! A S.M.A.R.T. goal is specific, measureable, attainable, realistic, and timely. For example, if your child is not completing his or her homework regularly, you might want to set a goal with your child regarding homework completion.

A goal like "hand in homework regularly" is not a S.M.A.R.T. goal. An example of a S.M.A.R.T. goal for homework completion might be to go at least one week without missing an assignment by January 31st. This goal gives a specific, measurable, attainable, and realistic task with a deadline so that both you and your child will know if he or she has reached the goal.

Once your child accomplishes the goal, you can help him or her adjust and set a new goal. You can assist your child in turning almost every goal into a S.M.A.R.T. goal, but remember that children often need help and support from adults to reach their goals. Below are some important tips on how parents can help their children to reach their goals:

- Have your child write down the goal he or she wants to achieve and hang it or put it somewhere he or she will see it regularly.
- Develop a plan with your child about how he or she is going to reach his or her goal. For the example above, you could set up a "homework time" every day.
 - · Reward your child for steps in the right direction and for accomplishing the goal.
- Be patient with your child when he or she does not reach his or her goal. Encourage your child to try again, and help your child adjust his or her goals when they become too easy or too difficult.
- Set a good example for your child by setting and writing down a S.M.A.R.T. goal for yourself. This may boost your child's self-esteem while also helping you to reach your goal at the same time!


I would like to share some of the information that we gathered from our last survey. Fifty-four parents responded to the survey:






96% of respondents felt that social and emotional skills were important to school success.

I believe that social and emotional skills are related to students' academic success. 54 responses




85% felt that their student had a positive attitude towards school.

76% of the respondents are not concerned about their child's social skills.


I am concerned about my child's social skills. 54 responses
