Five Championships in 8 Years!

On Saturday, February 13th, the Flinthills Middle School girls' basketball team won the "Battle of the Un-defeated Teams." Flinthills was 13-0 and South Haven was 12-0 and had not faced each other yet this season.

Comparing their stats made it look like it could be a great game. South Haven was averaging 40 points a game, and Flinthills was averaging 39 points a game. The highest score any opponent had earned against them was close too: South Haven had one game where the other team had a high of 21 points, and Flinthills had an opposing team score a season high of 18 points.

The Lady Mustangs had a slow start falling behind 6-2 early but led 9-8 after the first quarter. At half time, they took a 19-12 lead into the locker room. This may have been one of our worst shooting performances of the season as we struggled to make an easy bucket but were playing great defense. The 3rd quarter was won by South Haven 1-0 as the defenses prevailed. With a 6 point lead the Mustangs wore down the Cardinals in the 4th quarter and finished with a 32-17 win for the league title.

This made it an undefeated season for the girls and Back to Back Titles. It was the 5th League Championship in the last eight years.

Our 8th graders dominated the league this season and it was their 3rd consecutive championship game as the five starters had played against West Elk as 6th graders losing in a close game to an impressive Patriot team in the finals that year to get 2nd.

This team's strongest point is their defense! They fly around the court always putting pressure on the ball. We finished the year giving up only 135 points in 14 games

for an average of 9.6 points per game. Points are not the most important statistic, but easily the easiest to keep track of. This team is so unselfish and steals and assists are out the window; sometimes we have a tendency to over pass.

Offensively this season we scored 537 points, outscoring our opponents by over 400 points. Averaging 10 points a game, Paige Corter led the way with 140 points, higher than the total of all our opponents at 135. In a typical season we may have a season high close to 100 points in 16 games, but we were shorted 2 games also. Along with Paige

Emily Scribner also broke the 100 point mark scoring 107 with an average of 7.6 points per game. Harlee Randall also averaged 7.6 points per game but missed one game and scored 99 on the season. Rylie Wight had 90 points on the year with a 6.4 average, but also had the season high scoring 16 in one game. Tagen Carney is the 5th starter in the group and scored 57 points but was probably our best defensive player. We also had great contributions from Alex Scribner a 7th grader who plays incredible defense.

Letter from Mr. Hunter, the middle/high school principal....

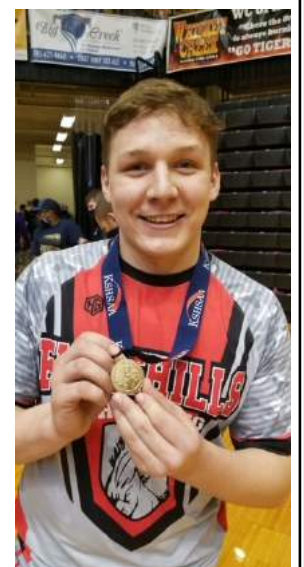
Did you know that participation in student-activities has been proven to increase a student's overall academic experience? Educational research and studies prove that students who participate in extra-curricular student activities have higher academic success, and a better overall outlook toward school resulting in higher academic ambitions. A University of Kansas study researched the performance of students in grades 9 to 12. The study showed that more than 97% of student athletes graduated high school, 10% higher than those students who had never participated in any student activities. The study also indicated that students who participated in school sponsored activities were also shown to have a better G.P.A (Grade Point Average) than those students who did not participate.

At Flinthills, we are very fortunate to offer several in-school and after-school sports, clubs, and activities. You will notice that several of these clubs are highlighted throughout our monthly Flinthills Flyer articles. In addition to after school athletic teams, Flinthills offers a wide variety of extracurricular opportunities for our middle and high school students. Meet the FHS English Department



Julie Mooney teaches 6th-9th grade English and 6th grade Social Studies. This is Ms. Mooney's fourth year at Flinthills and her 21st year in teaching. Julie grew up in the very southeast corner of Kansas in Galena. She graduated from high school in 1992. She then went on to Pittsburg State University where she received a Bachelors of Science degree in Education in December 1995.

Julie has three children—Jacie, Kody and Jessie—and three grandkids—Avarey, Grayson and Emma. Kody and Jessie are juniors at Flinthills High School. In her spare time she enjoys spending time with the grandkids, gardening, and reading.

Julie Rosenquist graduated with a Bachelor of Science in English Education from Emporia State University in 1999. She taught in North Lyon County for 9 years as a middle school language arts teacher. She taught a variety of elective courses and served on many committees: Site Council, SIT Team, Curriculum Coordinating Council, and was the district chairperson for the writing and reading committees. She was encouraged by administration



to pursue an administration degree; she followed that advice and graduated from Emporia State University in 2008 with a Masters in Building Leadership.

Mrs. Rosenquist left public education to work in the private sector and to spend more time with her son. She was able to travel to see him run cross country, run track, and perform in school productions which she had not been able to do before. She worked as a contract instructor in the Engineering Department at Wolf Creek Nuclear Operating Corporation. Her job was to teach and assess incoming tradesmen on site specific core classes. Tradesmen who passed their coursework were "badged" and were allowed on site to work with specific work crews during scheduled outages.

Public education called again, and she found herself back in the classroom in the LeRoy-Gridley school district as a middle school English teacher. After two years of teaching there, she moved into the building principal position, but she greatly missed connecting with kids and felt she was losing her passion for education. It was time for her to return to the classroom. She wanted to try teaching at the high school level this time.

She has worked here at Flinthills since 2017 as the high school English teacher and year-book sponsor. She sponsored middle school Scholars Bowl for two years and is very proud that we earned the league champs title both years. She also sponsored the freshmen class for two years and put together the Flinthills Flyer for a year-and-a-half. She has taught media literacy, creative writing, and two middle school social studies classes while at USD 492. She loves teaching new things and learning new material, concepts, and teaching methods because it is important for teachers to continue to learn and grow in the profession.

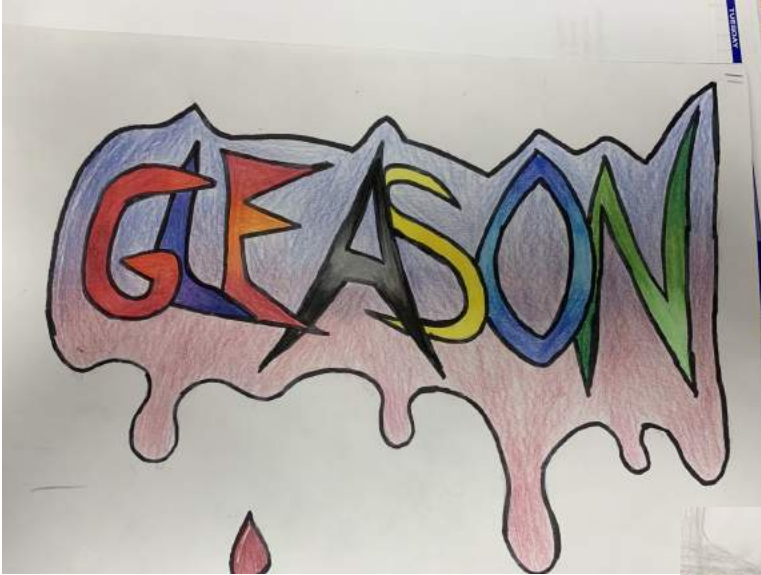

What's Happening in English Classes

Sophomores are reading about Gothic literature- both classic and modern. They have read "The Fall of the House of Usher," "House Taken Over," and "Where Is Here?" Today they are looking at the role of doppelgangers in gothic literature. Soon we will read *The Case of Dr. Jeckyll and Mr. Hyde*. We will follow that up with either *Frankenstein* or *Dracula*. I have not decided yet.

Juniors are in a unit about freedom. They explored different foundational texts: The Declaration of Independence, The Bill of Rights, The Preamble to the US Constitution, etc. They are currently completing an essay over their own definitions of freedom. Soon they will transition into American life before the founding documents existed. They will explore what life was like in 17 century America when rights and liberties were not guaranteed through the texts "First They Came," Anne Bradstreet's poetry, and Arthur Miller's *The Crucible*, which describes life during the Salem Witch trials.

Seniors are learning about British literature and the history of the English language. They each recited a portion of "Caedmon's Hymn," an Old English text; they will recite a portion of the prologue to *The Canterbury Tales*. The seniors are exploring why the English language changed so much and why the language incorporates other languages like Greek, Latin, French, and Old Norse. Soon seniors will read *The Canterbury Tales*. Afterward, students will examine the Globe Theatre in London and will eventually read *Macbeth* by Shakespeare.

Choice Classes

In the 2020-21 school year, Flinthills was accepted into the KSDE Redesign program. Redesign is intended to provide opportunities to more fully meet the needs of our students and allow our district to remain fluid in our attempts to meet those needs.

One of our initial changes was to install the MUSTANG Schedule. The MUSTANG schedule creates changes in the order of classes. This prevents students that are consistently leaving early for extra-curricular activities from missing the same late day classes. The MUSTANG schedule has also created a time slot for Choice Classes. Each class meets for 3 one-hour sessions.

Choice classes are classes that expose students to areas of interest that they normally would not be able to investigate. Flinthills has been very fortunate to be able to reach out into the community and get a number of community members to share their knowledge and passion with the students. This civic unselfishness has been very appreciated by the students at Flinthills.

Here is a list of a few of the choice classes used this year.: Photography, Sports Announcing, Clothing Design, Trapping, Western Artistry, Bit and Spur Making, On-Line Business, Entrepreneur, Jewelry Making, Leathercraft, Auctioneer/Realty, Roping, Campfire Cooking, Dress to Impress, Uses of Honey, Geocaching, Dessert Decorating, Peaceful Conflict Resolution, and Tying Blankets.

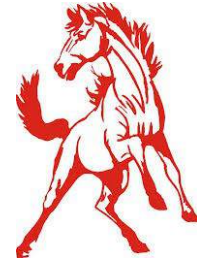
