# Washington, D.C. Gets Visit From Flinthills

Every two years Flinthills students, families & friends travel to Washington DC to learn first-hand our nation's history. This June 22 Flinthills travelers loaded a plane in Wichita to spend 4 days/3 nights exploring our nation's monuments, museums and buildings. for a special event. The time allocated for that visit was added to our time at the Smithsonian Natural History Museum. Day 1. Arriving in DC the first stop was the FDR & MLK memorials. Our tour guide KJ was amazing, giving us a thorough explanation of the meaning behind these memorials. The next stop was the 9-11 Pentagon Memorial. After KJ explained the meaning behind the benches and their placement our group began



saurs, aquatics, prehistoric people, gemstones and butterflies to name a few. A photo stop at the White House allowed students to take some pictures and see the protest "tent" that has been there continuously since the Vietnam War due to a

to wander through the memorial. An elderly man was sitting on one of the benches and when approached he shared that he'd been there that fateful day and had lost 5 people from his office. He shared a story about three lit windows that were the point of impact that fateful day. The lights in these rooms are hard wired so they cannot be turned off as another tribute to those lost. Dinner at the Pentagon Mall, then off to the hotel. End Day 1.

Day 2. We started our day at the Smithsonian Air and Space Museum – Dulles Annex. We viewed actual planes that had either flown in war or were prototypes, including the Discovery which flew 39 missions and orbited 5,830 times around the earth. We had lunch at the food trucks, then on to the Holocaust Museum. The museum is designed so you start at the top floor where the Nazi propaganda began. As you work your way through the exhibit you see the atrocities committed, then end with stories of resistance, bravery and heroism. Leaving the museum we headed to the American History Museum which was closed

paperwork mistake. Dinner at the Hard Rock Café was followed by a walk around the Capitol Building. We weren't able to tour the building since it is closed to the public. We finished our evening with an illuminated tour of the Vietnam Wall Memorial, Nurses Memorial and the Lincoln Memorial, along with a walk beside the Reflecting Pool. End Day 2.

Day 3. Ford's Theater and the Peterson House were the first stop of the day. We viewed the booth where Lincoln was shot and then toured the house across the street where Lincoln died. The Peterson House exhibit details the funeral processional from DC to Springfield Illinois, along with the capture of Booth & Herold. An impressively massive tower of Lincoln books greets you as you descend down the stairs into the gift shop. A tour of the National Cathedral is always a group favorite. The stained glass windows at the upper level of the main chapel area are 3 stories tall just to give you an idea of how massive this building is. (Continued on page 16)

### **Title I Program Information**

Title I is a federal program that provides additional reading and/or math instruction. The students who qualify are not learning disabled. They just need extra help with math or reading.

### What are the goals of Title I?

The Title I program strives to provide an environment that:

Promotes a positive attitude toward reading Improves student achievement in reading and math Builds students' self-esteem and confidence

### How does my child qualify for Title I?

Several different criteria are used to qualify a student. AimsWeb scores, Pathways to Reading assessments, and teacher recommendations are considered when referring a student for Title I services.

### Will my child always be in the program?

No. We work closely with the classroom teacher to monitor student progress. When a student's reading or math achievement reaches their appropriate grade level, the student is dropped from the program if the Title I teacher and classroom teacher feel the student no longer needs the extra support.

### How does Title I benefit my child?

The Title I teacher provides intensive, individualized instruction to students who need it. As students experience success, they gain confidence in their abilities and their performance in the classroom improves.

### Parents Right to Know

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), parents may request information regarding the professional qualifications of their child's/children's classroom teachers and paraprofessionals including:

Whether or not the teacher has met Kansas licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas being taught;

The baccalaureate degree and any other graduate certification or degree and the field of discipline of both; If services are provided by paraprofessionals, their qualifications;

If the teacher is teaching under an emergency or professional waiver.

Parents will be contacted by the school if their child(ren) is taught for four or more continuous weeks by a teacher that does not meet the appropriate state certification standards.

All students/families served in schoolwide buildings and students/families served in targeted assistance programs must complete a parent school compact.

All parents will be informed they have the right to request their child'/children's state assessment scores and they have a right to obtain the school and school district state report cards.

# TSA WINS AT NATIONALS!

After a very successful TSA state competition the Flinthills TSA team consisting of 5 members and their advisor headed to Dallas Texas to compete at the National TSA Conference. Brandon Gleason, Dawson Sharp, Jonathan McCreight, Adley Humig and Amanda Brown were ready to compete as they entered the Gaylord Conference Center in Grapevine TX, the location of this year's conference. The conference ran June 26-June 30. Starting each day in a giant conference room, large enough to hold all 6000 people in attendance, students participated in National officer elections, parliamentary procedures, business meetings and daily updates. They then spent the day in competition, eating (a Flinthills favorite!), exchanging state pins with other states, leadership training workshops and making new friends. Our students competed in Music Production, Digital Video Production, Fashion Design, On Demand Video and Technical Problem Solving. All of these events placed at the state competition. The conference ended with the awards ceremony where Jonathan McCreight and Dawson Sharp placed 3<sup>rd</sup> overall in Technical Problem Solving, beating out well over 100 competitors! Placing in the top 10 is a huge accomplishment, and to bring home a trophy is even bigger! Brandon Gleason, Adley Humig, and Amanda Brown also competed, with all three attending in person for the first time.

At the end of the conference the TSA 2021-2022 held a meeting where they symbolically passed the torch to the 2022-2023 state officer team. Jonathan and Brandon served the past school year on the state officer team and handed over the reigns to Adley and Amanda who will serve in this upcoming school year.

We didn't have much time to explore Dallas, but we did visit the Reunion Tower where we viewed Dallas from an outdoor balcony at 470 feet in the air. We enjoyed looking at the nearby buildings and their fantastic light shows. A quick stop at the Oklahoma City Memorial on the way home was a bonus as none of my students had ever heard of the bombing and were interested in learning a bit of local history.




# **TSA State Officer Training**

Adley & Amanda represented Kansas TSA and Flinthills well and I look forward to watching them grow throughout the upcoming school year! -Mrs. Michal Austin










# FFA Starts Year with Retreat and Fun





# Child Find Screenings



# PARENTS


Studies show that the first few years of a child's life are critical to the development of certain milestones. Some children may exhibit problems with talking, hearing, seeing, thinking or during routine tasks. Many problems may show improvement if the problems are found and addressed early in the child's life. Early intervention education programs and/or services can help many children.

Early education is important for exceptional children. Early intervention can enable children to make gains in several areas before reaching school age. Some delays or disabilities may be improved by preschool intervention and early education services.



### Early Childhood Special Education Programs

The Butler County Special Education Interlocal currently operates seven centerbased early childhood developmental preschool classrooms. These classrooms are located in Andover, Augusta, Douglass, Leon, El Dorado, Towanda/Greenwich and Rose Hill. Each center conducts two sessions per day, four days per week, Monday through Thursday. Evaluations are generally scheduled on Fridays.



### Screening Program

If you are concerned about your child's development, there are free developmental screenings offered monthly in each district. The screenings include vision and hearing, and a check on developmental areas such as; language, thinking skills, fine and gross motor skills, social and self-help skills.

### Program Goals

- To enhance the physical, cognitive, emotional, and social development of the children served;
- To help families foster their children's development through education and supportive services;
- To individualize services for children and to encourage family involvement in determining the needed services; and,
- To address the total needs of the children and to prepare them for transition to elementary school.

#### School Board Information Regarding Unpaid Meal Charges

The district's meal charging requirements are as follows:

A charge account for students paying full or reduced price for meals may be established with the district. Students may charge no more than {\$20 worth of/5} meals to this account. Charging of a la carte or extra items to this account will not be permitted.

Any student failing to keep his/her account solvent as required by the district shall not be allowed to charge further meals until the negative account balance has been paid in full. However, such students will be allowed to purchase a meal if the student pays for the meal when it is received. Students who have charged the maximum allowance to this account and cannot pay out of pocket for a meal will be provided an alternate meal consisting of a peanut butter, peanut butter alternative, or cheese sandwich and milk.

At least one written warning shall be provided to a student and his/her parent or guardian prior to denying meals for exceeding the district's charge limit. If payment of the negative balance is not received within 5 working days of the maximum charge limit being attained, the debt will be turned over to the superintendent or superintendent's designee for collection in accordance with board policy DP. If the debt is not paid within 10 days of mailing the final notice of the negative account balance under policy DP, it shall be considered bad debt for the purposes of federal law concerning unpaid meal charges.

Payments for school meals may be made at the school or district office {or online at www.usd492.revtrak.net}. Parents, and guardians of students are encouraged to prepay meal costs.

The district will provide a copy of this unpaid meal charges policy to all households at or before the start of school each year and to families and students that transfer into the district at the time of transfer. The terms of this policy will also be communicated to all district staff responsible for enforcing any aspect of the policy. Records of how and when it is communicated to households and staff will be retained.
