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








Spelling Bee Champs Ready to Go to Next Level

Band Members Attend Honor Bands



Bands consider the time between football and contest their "off season" and use that time to put together honor bands. An Honor Band is a group of top students from numerous high schools who get together for a very short period of time, usually a day, and put together music for an entire concert.

In November, Brylee Heimgartner (trumpet), Joliene Dragoo (trumpet), Madison Alvord (trumpet), Taren Lakin (bass clarinet), Kyle Parker (percussion), Laura Scribner (percussion/mallets), Harlee Randall (saxophone), Emily Scribner (saxophone), Rylie Wight (trombone), Lilly McNary (clarinet), Addison Cartmell (clarinet), Yeva Nikolskaya-Taylor (clarinet), Cami Dutton (trombone), and Keira Poston (flute) went to Emporia State University the Saturday before Thanksgiving and spent the day playing with a 90 piece band.

Both of the Emporia band instructors are also published composers and direct the bands as they play pieces the directors have composed. This gives the kids a completely different view of the music because they will explain why they chose to have this instrument or that play.

The high school students spend part of the day listening to ESU ensembles like the marching band, the jazz band, and numerous ensembles. We were excited to see Savannah McCreight, one of our alumni, in the ESU marching band.



KSU Concert Band Clinic

The first "paper auditions" come for the Kansas State University Concert Band Clinic in October. High School band directors send in names of students they think would be able to participate in the weekend of intense music making. While the typical honor band, like Emporia, sends music out ahead of time, K-State does not. Once the selected students arrive on campus Friday afternoon, they go through a live audition where they have to play in front of grad students to earn their spot in one of six bands. These bands are directed by conductors from all around the country; this year, they came from Nebraska, Georgia, Ohio, Minnesota, Oklahoma and New Jersey.

When the students return to McCain Auditorium for a concert at 6:30, their weekend starts. After the concert, they find out which band they are in, what part, and what chair. Then, they report for their first practice which is also the first time they have seen their music.

Saturday is spent in rehearsals, master classes with the college professor of each instrument, sectionals led by grad students and another concert by the nationally recognized KSU concert band.

Sunday is filled with final rehearsals and the concerts starting at 1:00. It's always amazing to hear what complete strangers can accomplish making music in two days. On January $24^{\rm th}$, the Ag Business class got the opportunity to tour Rommey Farms which is located in Cassoday, KS. They have over 52 acres and 15 seasonal employees.

They produce 92 different varieties of plants. Not only do they produce plants, they also have bee hives and 18 laying hens to produce eggs and honey.


They sell their product to different local markets and restaurants and sell their flowers to florists. They

also can make their own flower arrangements for weddings and funerals.

Susan and her husband Don produce food for themselves during the winter and also feed 6 different families each week as well.
